MIXING METAL FINISHES

Mixed metals can go a long way toward giving a home character and depth. Here are a few rules of thumb from Lindsey on how to mix them well.

- **1. DON'T MIX TOO MANY FINISHES.** Lindsey recommends that you don't mix more than three different finishes. "We love to mix metals," she says, "but there is a balance to how many you can mix." Sticking with two or three will still add depth while keeping the overall look of the room cohesive.
- 2. PAIR WELL. Make sure all your chosen finishes go with one another. For example, if you're using brass, which is a warm metal, you'll want to complement it with another material that has warm tones. While chrome and polished nickel are both silver in color, polished nickel is warmer, so use that instead of chrome. Black accents can go either way. The most important element to strive for is balance, with no one finish overpowering the others.
- USE LIKE ELEMENTS. Lastly, make sure each type of metal is used for a whole element. For example, all plumbing should use the same finish, all hardware should use the same, and so on.
